**Alexa Burk for GISA President**

I'm Alexa Burk, 2<sup>nd</sup> year PhD candidate of International History, and I would like to serve you in the position of GISA President.

My platform will be an extension of the one I've been building on campus for the last 1.5 years. It's the kind of platform where, when advocacy was needed, I founded the IHEID Parent Initiative and created the first "**IHEID student parent guide**" which provides long requested information to student parents. Where I saw community action was necessary, I worked with the VP for PhD's to disseminate a statistic infographic on the "**facts about the new student residence**." I'm proud of the stance many IHEID initiatives and students subsequently took, which supported GISA negotiations for lowered housing costs. As with the statistics I believe that honest and open communication about our shared experience at IHEID unifies us as a community we are proud to share. This is why I developed the findings of GISA's microaggression survey from last year into the **microaggression campaign** for Gender and Diversity month. The series was engaged by 8000 people throughout Switzerland and spread to University of Geneva and University of Zurich campuses.

Most recently, with the COVID-19 crisis I created the **Solidarity Initiative** thread on our Facebook group. With the support of the Welfare Committee, we then put our heads together and created the institutes COVID-19 mutual aid network.

Praxis and inclusivity are my foundations, and I hope my record at IHEID shows my willingness to take action when necessary, lean into the support and strength of our wonderful community when needed, and provide the tools and space for others to also take the lead. I am a community maker, an information disseminator, an avid researcher, and a wholehearted "leader from the back."

While not an exhaustive list due to the word limit on platforms, here are some big goals I'd like to achieve:

- 1) **Reduce the cost of student housing** and encourage the allowance of 10-month leases.
- 2) **Reduce cost of meals at the cafeteria:** The price of the plat de jour is on average 5 chf more at our cafeteria than for the **same exact plate** at the University of Geneva. Novae runs them both.
- 3) **Increase access (and transparency) to scholarships and financial aid.** I have a comprehensive understanding of the Institute's finances. The new Director will certainly propose some funding reform and this is a perfect chance to advocate for what students have consistently requested for 8 years.

Further goals include on campus amenities for students, increased French classes and bilingual communications, increased engagement with the student body, and the creation of a "state of the institute" report to be given to the new Director in September on behalf of student interests. I look forward to the debates where I can go into more specific solutions to the goals of my presidency. 😊 **Much respect and solidarity, my fellow colleagues!**

Hi all!

Since starting in September, my student activist heart could not stop noticing institutional issues which adversely affect student's experiences at IHEID. My activist journey started back in my home country of Slovakia, where I carried out the duties of board member in the national student body representing secondary school students. Through this role, I was also able to participate in the discussions and projects on inclusive and student-focused reforms in educational curricula within the European umbrella body (OBESSU) for student unions. Keeping up my activism during university, I was a VP for Academic Activities in the European Law Student Association branch in Exeter and I was also a class representative for a course offered to 50 students. I want to utilise all this experience to create a more friendly, more supportive environment which would serve the needs of students. If anything, the Covid-19 pandemic has underlined how vulnerable us students are and that IHEID and its community has a major role in helping us thrive. Out of my many ideas for reform, I would highlight three:

1. Opening a discussion among students and the university about a potential **centralised mitigation system** so that students would no longer be required to address each individual professor when in need of mitigation, **guaranteeing simplicity, transparency, and sensitivity to our individual circumstances**.
2. **Open a discussion about clear, general grading criteria** for master students rather than having individual criteria for each course. I believe this would **enhance transparency and provide clear guidance** as to what is expected of students coming from **diverse educational backgrounds**.
3. **Boost cooperation between PhD and Master students**, such as a potential mentorship scheme and ability to be involved in some of the opportunities which are currently exclusive for PhD students. This **would boost the sense of community and enhance cooperation** within the student body.

Further, I would like to devote attention to **students on exchange as well as students on PhD fast-track** who are generally left with very little support and guidance. I am also in favour of building on topics such as **affordable housing options** and **student finance support**, and I am of course open to your suggestions!
